She also establishes some very plausible linkages between her research and the Paleo-Verdo-Jaundoists' theory of weed envy, making this article of great interest to scholars in both schools of thought.

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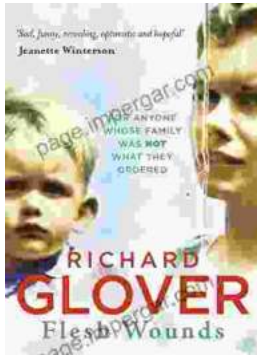
